It is always rewarding to be a part of the big show and you don't necessarily need special skills.



From the Past

Humorous extracts from an article by Scott Smith published in Theatre Organ magazine July/ August 2001 This article compiled by Robert Weismantel

One of the greatest challenges facing an organ tuner at any given time is that of finding a good keyholder. To the casual observer, it would appear to be a simple, straightforward, albeit boring job that anyone remotely familiar with a keyboard could perform well. In a pinch, tuners occasionally have



to use whoever is available, but as with any other skilled labor, knowledge and experience are the keys to a job well done.

Virtually every person who tunes pipe organs to any degree began as a keyholder.

The best of these have picked up tips and methods from the various tuners they held keys for over a period of time, as well as developing their own. It all adds up to a tighter, more long-lasting tune with greater musical (and neurological) satisfaction for all.

First and foremost is a good, solid relationship between the keyholder and the tuner. The best results will come with mutual patience, trust and respect. If not, it's going to be a grim time with lots of stress for both parties. There can also be times of misunderstanding because of distance, console or chamber placement. To be heard clearly in large rooms, tuners often have to yell instructions to the keyholder. This can be misinterpreted as dissatisfaction. Don't let it bother you. While the tuner is generally the one to be calling the shots, both parties are absolutely equal in their importance in this job.

The first thing any reputable tuner will do is to establish a tuning or reference rank. Ideally, this is the set of pipes to which all others in the organ are tuned.

Church tuners traditionally use the 4' Great Octave, as it is generally not under expression and can be heard in the enclosed divisions. However, the Principal or Diapason ranks normally found in theatre organs are too fat, too dark and too hootey to fill the bill adequately. A medium-scaled string, like a Salicional will work as long as it doesn't "dither" or fly off speech. The best tuners use a string rank at two pitches for razor-sharp tuning. Remember that the theatre organ is full of exaggerated sounds and, because of that, sometimes there is a need to use a tuning fork to tune a single pipe (generally "A") in the middle of the reference rank. From there, the tuner will tune the rest of the middle octave to it, using intervals of fourths and fifths, tweak it carefully, and then tune the rest of the reference rank to it. On long or late night tuning sessions, occasionally laying down on the bench is legal, but not good if you're being monitored by the customer



If you hold keys for church tuners, you're going to run into mixture ranks. These will go slow, trust me.

Do what you can to break the boredom. If you're skilled at all with key holding, you can easily multi task. While holding keys, I've been known to dust the console, screw on name plates, re-set the clock, even read a book. In fact, most of this article was written while holding keys!

Nearly every console in the universe has a collection of pencils and/or pens. (In fact, most of them are usually below the pedal keys!) These will come in handy in more ways than one. I usually like to have some sort of writing implement at my disposal, a lined pad and craft or Popsicle sticks. The lined pad will come in handy if the tuner asks you to remember where a certain pipe is that he may have handled and wants to cool off before attempting final tuning. It's the key holder's job to keep track of these things. A tuner's chief pet peeve is a keyholder who can't remember where he was if they stop tuning in the middle of a rank. The craft sticks will come in handy to lay on the keys for reference later on, and won't roll off like pencils and pens. If the tuner takes a pipe out to work on it, marking the note with a pencil or craft stick will help you to easily find it later. Use the keyboard directly above or below the one you're using to tune to mark any reference notes so as not to impede your progress.

So, remember, if the tuner asks you to "find the hole," know that he's not talking about the orchestra pit!

The keyholder has to be the Great Diplomat. If the organist comes in during a tuning session, tuning should stop immediately (remember to mark where you stopped!). The organist should communicate his needs to the keyholder, or better yet, the keyholder should summon the tuner to come down and speak directly with the organist. If the organist has left a list of priorities, it's the key holder's job to gently remind the tuner of what's on it, to ensure completion of the list. The diplomacy needs to work the other way, too. When others are talking loudly or making excessive noise, it's the keyholder's job to diplomatically ask that they either stop or leave. Most people, even long-term organ buffs don't realize that tuners need *complete* silence in the listening space in order to complete their task accurately and in a timely manner. So, if you enter a room where an organ is being tuned, and you're not the tuner or the keyholder, be pre-pared to use sign language!

Some years prior to his untimely death, Fr. Jim Miller was engaged to play a concert at one of his least favorite venues. Finding the organ to be horribly out of tune, he asked to have at least the reeds tuned. One of the more eager volunteers mentioned how he knew how to tune and would be happy to comply with the request. Fr. Jim, equally skilled as a keyholder and tuner happily held keys for the volunteer to tune the Tuba. As the volunteer descended the ladder, Fr. Jim checked the rank. The tuning was awful! So back up the ladder the volunteer went and with the entire process repeated, down he came. Again, the tuning was terrible; maybe even worse than when they'd started. Fr. Jim, puzzled by this turn of events asked the volunteer to show him what he was doing. When both had ascended the ladder into the chamber, the volunteer said, " ... well, first I stand on this big box over here ... " The big box turned out to be the Main regulator! Standing on it probably raised the wind pressure by several inches of pressure! No wonder the tuning was so bad! The moral of this story is that, even though the volunteer tuner could probably tune all right, his knowledge of other factors that affected the organ were safe and were here lacking.

There have been numerous attempts at replacing us with automation. Hard-wired stepping switches have been around for years, and aren't that hard to build. Modern software-based relay/control systems now utilize cordless telephones, allowing the tuner to advance notes, go back, repeat, change ranks and do nearly everything a keyholder can do. They can't, however, carryon an intelligent conversation over lunch, they won't bring tools to you, they won't drive you home if you're tired, and they won't offer to get coffee for you. They don't smile, they have no sense of humor and they don't play silly little tunes on individual ranks after you've successfully completed tuning them. I guess they have their place.

Flashback

Recently Trevor Himstedt posted a TV Week snippet from November 1967 on the Facebook page Brisbane Television & Radio



Wilbur Kentwell is struggling to read through the enormous amounts of mail that arrive at TVQ0 studios for him. Wilbur's request music show is seen eight times a week, but he has enough requests to run for three weeks.

Wilbur Davies Kentwell (1914–1981) by <u>G. D.</u> <u>Rushworth</u> <u>Australian Dictionary of</u> <u>Biography, Volume 17</u>, 2007

Wilbur Davies Kentwell (1914-1981), musician, was born on 20 January 1914 at Castle Hill, Sydney, sixth surviving child of John Amos Kentwell, carpenter, and his wife Lucretia, née Davies, both born in New South Wales. Wilbur attended Parramatta High School to Intermediate level. Possessing innate musical ability, he had begun some limited formal musical tuition at the age of 8. After later instruction in organ playing, in his early teens he played for services at his local church. He was introduced to the theatre organ and public entertainment through the large Christie

instrument at the Roxy Theatre, Parramatta, where he later performed professionally. From 1939 he was resident organist at the Savoy Theatre, New Lambton, Newcastle, for some five years, using a Hammond electronic organ. He also worked as a salesman.

In the later 1940s Kentwell became resident organist at the Vogue Theatre, Double Bay, while playing regularly at several other theatres and at the Trocadero ballroom, Sydney—sometimes dashing between two engagements in the one evening. He was also staff organist at radio-station 2CH until appointed director of music to Macquarie Broadcasting Services Pty Ltd. There he attained national fame, particularly through his association with Jack Davey, who enjoyed an enormous following. Kentwell undertook freelance work for 2KY and 2UE, and for Australian Broadcasting Commission radio, on which he performed both as a soloist and in a trio. He also composed songs, writing words and music. His musicianship brought him engagements on radio as an associate artist with many celebrities, including Bob Hope, Nat King Cole, Anne Ziegler and Webster Booth, Peter Dawson, Gladys Moncrieff and George Formby.

After local television transmission started, Kentwell moved to Brisbane as director of music at Channel 9; he later worked for Channel 0. He also began teaching his techniques of theatre organ entertainment, and continued until his death. As well as making many recordings on traditional theatre organs, he used electronic instruments, particularly the Hammond organs (produced in the United States of America from the 1930s), which became popular with radio stations, theatres and nightclubs.

Reputed to be able to play more than one thousand melodies from memory, Kentwell was one of the last of a group of versatile musicians who provided `live' incidental, accompaniment and effect music, which was a characteristic feature of radio broadcasts up to the end of the 1950s. Predeceased by his wife, he died of head injuries and barbiturate intoxication on 9 February 1981 at Toowong and was cremated. His daughter survived him.
